


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# The Food Lover's Guide To Paris: The Best Restaurants, Bistros, Cafés, Markets, Bakeries, And More

Let's face it. Finding the best of the fabled cuisine in Paris can be difficult for us Americans. We're thrown off by the language, the numerous terms for eateries, and the French themselves, who love to pretend they don't speak English. That's why Patricia Wells's updated guide, now in its fourth

edition, is a hit. With detailed information on 450 restaurants, Wells takes readers by the hand and demystifies the culture so well known for its luscious food and demanding gourmands. Sidebars abound: she dissects breads, foie gras, and oysters--and even gives the cultural background on why the French may drink wine in the morning (to kill worms, of course), as well as discussing the pros and cons of eating the rinds of cheeses. Also listed are the best bakeries, cafÃ©s, and specialty shops, as well as 50 recipes to try at home. If there is a criticism to be made of this sturdy and informative book, it's of the writing of this International Herald Tribune critic, which is sometimes riddled with stock descriptions and clichÃ©s. Yet readers are likely to forgive her this occasional foible, as Wells's interesting details and enthusiasm are enough to send devout Italophiles, even, to Paris--where they can sink their teeth into those crusty baguettes. --Melissa Rossi --This text refers to an alternate Paperback edition.

"The Food Lover's Guide to Paris" by Patricia Wells is a completely revised edition of her popular Parisian restaurant guide. The new guide reviews the best restaurants, bistros, cafÃ©s, markets, bakeries and includes some recipes as well. If I were going to Paris, this book would be going with me. Each section begins with a brief overview of what to anticipate within that grouping and then details the recommended restaurant/bistro/cafÃ© by Arrondissement. Some details include: the type of cuisine, address, phone #, closest Metro stations, days open and closed, prices, specialties and atmosphere (with suggestions on what to wear). I wish, I'd had this book back in October 2012, during a two week stay in Paris.

I have been a big fan of Patricia Wells' recipe books for a very long time, especially her bistro cookbook. So, I was excited to see that she had put her intimate knowledge of the where, how, and insider info. of food in Paris into a book to share what she has learned over many years there. We can only be there for short times every few years, so this book will be a very valuable resource for us. We always rent an apartment and do much of our own cooking when in Paris so I will make extensive use of her lists of markets, bakeries, butchers, etc. Her writing is, as always, clear and to the point.
