


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Uruguay, 1968: Student Activism From Global Counterculture To Molotov Cocktails (Violence In Latin American History)



Synopsis

By exploring the intersection of activism, political violence, and youth culture, Uruguay, 1968 offers new insights about such subjects as the “New Left” and “Revolutionary Left” that are central to our historical understanding of the 1960s across the globe.

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
