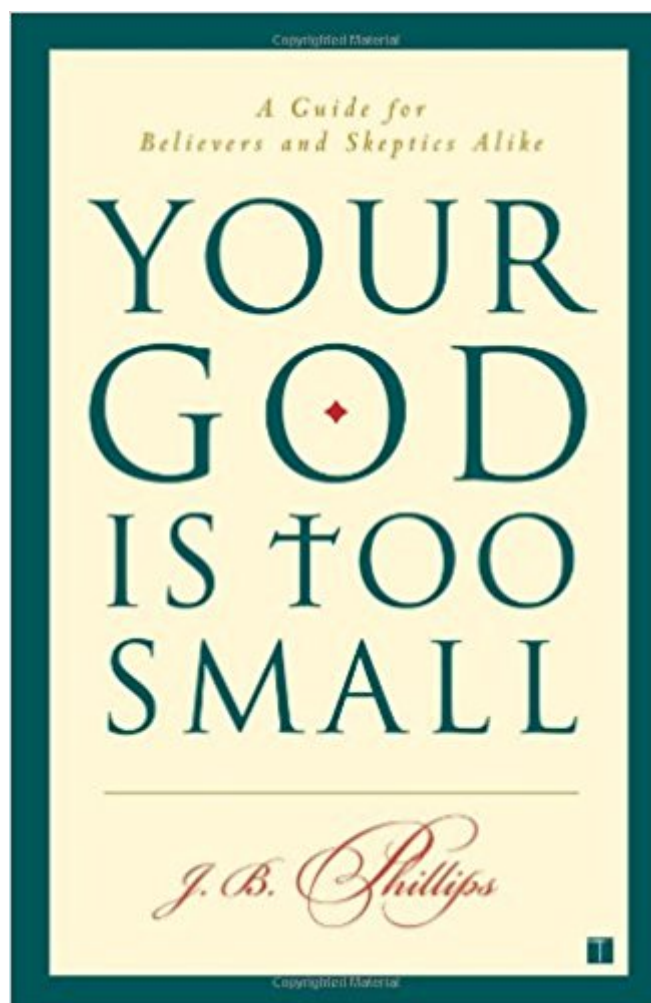

J.B. Phillips died in 1983. A canon of the Anglican church, his works include The Newborn Christian and his highly acclaimed translation The New Testament in Modern English.

Second half of the book, I had trouble getting through. But the first half of the book makes it worth

buying. The book is small, and brief, and having half of it not be so good, may seem like it isn't worth it. But the first half is so good, so insightful, even though very few pages, that the book is worth buying. It is written from a Christian perspective, but one need not be Christian to find the first half of the book enlightening, regarding the concept of a deity that isn't the one most people don't believe in. Yes, I wrote that correctly. The author does a credible job of explaining why people come to think that atheism is best, due to the childish, small god they think is the only option for a believing person. Written in the 1950's, and some of it is dated. But the philosophy is sound.

Stripping away the needless doctrinal details of the various denominations, Phillips focusses brilliantly on the fundamental Christian story and its revolutionary but simple way of life. The book is divided into two parts, the destructive and the constructive. In the first part, Phillips lays waste twelve limiting, sometimes paralyzing, ideas of God in Jesus name, ideas such as the "cosmic policeman," or the "God of 100%" or the "Gentle Jesus meek and mild." They are all worth understanding, unraveling, and disposing of. In the second part of the book, the incarnation of God in the form of Jesus is explained in such a direct and convincing way that believer and unbeliever alike will appreciate the Christian model with perfect clarity. If you want the ESSENCE of Christian teaching, minus all the extraneous trappings, and told in a wonderfully simple way, this is the book for you!"
